Brook Farm is a large area located on the Newton/West Roxbury. It's next to St. Joseph's cemetery and a great place to study wetlands. In the early 1900's, the area was used as a self-sufficient community for famous transcendentalists such as Nathaniel Hawthorne. (I'll explain more tomorrow). Several animals such as birds and wolves use the vast wetland area to eat and breed. There are several trails that lead all the way up to the Charles River.

The wetland area is a great example of pond succession; changes in a pond.



However, it is apparently a historic site, being once the location of an artist colony frequented by the likes of such literary greats as Nathaniel Hawthorn. 




